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

ABOUT THE PLAYWRIGHT

Harvey is a playwright, director, and instructor at The Western Stage and a member of the Central Coast Writers Club, and The Fifth Age Playwrights, a senior writer's group. He has directed plays at the Court Theatre in Chicago, Illinois; The Front Street Theater in Memphis, Tennessee; and the California Actor's Theatre in Los Gatos, California. Harvey's plays have been presented at Theatre Forty in Los Angeles, California; the Carl Cherry Theater in Carmel, California; and The Western Stage in Salinas, California.



Tonight's Programme

The Three R's is a sometimes comedic, sometimes dramatic, and sometimes abstract exploration of the issue of Responsibility—who bears it and who is held responsible. Local playwright Harvey Landa crafted three separate acts, each of which will have its own director and cast, but which will fit together as a coordinated full-length play.

A Note About the Project

What might seem to the casual viewer "simply a play" is also, in the case of *The Three R's*, the product of a class with several teaching goals. Like all TWS SpringFEST projects, this one serves to prepare participants for larger future roles in our main season and elsewhere. Three new or new-ish directors were chosen to be mentored in the art of direction and they, in turn, brought in cast members to be mentored by their individual directors and by myself as the project instructor. Finally, our playwright Harvey Landa is afforded a chance to see what directors and actors do with his work before determining the next phase in his script's development. I have been impressed by the exploration and growth I have witnessed and by the chance to exchange ideas with these younger artists. We all hope that as audience members you, too, will receive a creative spark from this work.

A Message from Artistic Program Director, Melissa Chin-Parker

From its inception, SpringFEST has been about providing people of all skill levels the empowering experience of performance and giving developing artists the chance to grow and improve. We invite you to become a member of our theatre community — to find out "there's no place like home."



The majority of SpringFEST performances are free to attend, except for two musical presentations that have a nominal ticket price of \$5 and \$15 (Hartnell students FREE). SpringFEST's Open Studio, which provides small groups and theatre students the opportunity to showcase their work in the intimate Studio Theater, will host Artists Ink, Alisal High School, and Hartnell Theatre Arts & Cinema students in. A requested donation at the door will support these local emerging theatre groups.

Participation in SpringFEST serves as a great introduction to the rigors and commitment of time required in TWS' subscription plays and musicals, but at a less accelerated pace. In addition, donations to TWS mean enrollment fees for SpringFEST have been sponsored, making high-quality arts instruction available to everyone.

I was fortunate to have grown up when music, dance and theatre were provided as a consistent part of my public schooling. It gave me not only confidence to express myself through many mediums, but helped me find my individuality while at the same time, a commonality with others.

Because the arts have all but disappeared from most schools, I believe we have a responsibility to work towards making arts access easier and the cost of high-quality experiences non-prohibitive. SpringFEST is one such means.

Act I: Give Me An R

Directed by Jonathan Perez

This comedic intro to the R issue centers on Bernie, an actor hired to play the historical Japanese general Yamashita, who was held responsible for Japanese war crimes during WWII. Bernie sees the role as his last chance at a big break--yet the production keeps veering off track into increasingly bizarre attempts to create a "hit." Bernie's actor's nightmare is his struggle to decide whether he should risk angering the director and designers by pointing out how artistically disastrous their choices are becoming. But if he doesn't, isn't he a collaborator or enabler, sharing responsibility for the mess the show is becoming? (55 min)

Act II: The Free Companions

Directed by Colin St. John

Switching to drama, we meet Rusty, better known as Lt. Wm. Calley, found guilty of war crimes for his actions in the My Lai Massacre during the Vietnamese War. Under house arrest on an army base, Rusty gathers together some members of his unit to record what they have to say about their tours in Vietnam for a book Rusty means to write, explaining why the massacre occurred and why he should not be held responsible for it. The army buddies swing wildly from reminiscing to going for each other's throats. (45 min)

Act III: The Gallows Bag

Directed by Cindy Womack

An over-eager theatrical Chorus brings a Journalist through a surrealistic journey. Researching a story in which he intends to prove General Yamashita innocent, the Journalist travels to the Philippines to the gallows where General Yamashita was hung. There he finds a mysterious Old Man who wants only to die. Their strange interaction sparks the Journalist's realization that he is on a personal journey of discovery while struggling with questions of family responsibility. (35 min)
